Kelly Valliere, American Legion Post 57 First Vice-Commander, said American Legion Post 57 and the VFW are joining forces to host this year's Veterans Day Parade.

will take place from 8-10 a.m. The parade will end at Memorial Stadium, 294 NW Stadium Terrace.

over 50 entries," Valliere said. "We have Columbia High School JROTC, band and Tigerettes. We also have the Fort White High School band and numerous members of the community have stepped-up with their vans, trucks and what have you. All of law enforcement officers are going to be involved, so we've got Columbia County Sheriff's Department, Lake City Police Department, forestry, Dept. of Agriculture, VA police."

The Parade Grand Marshal will be Construction and Electrician Master Chief Kenneth Bowen.

Bowen was a POW from Beirut, Lebanon from June 1985-July 85. Bowen is a Lake City resident and is a member of American Legion Post 57.

"He's the only POW in Lake City that I'm aware of," Valliere said.

Other parade entries will include American Legion Riders, Combat Veterans Motorcycle Association, and the motorcycles are

expected to be out front for this year's parade, with the Florida Highway Patrol and Lake City Police Department officers leading them out.

Valliere said she is anticipating at least 60 entries for this year's parade.

"There's a lot of appli-

cations still out there and people talking to their corporate offices, so I'm expecting at least 60," she

Unlike previous Veterans Day Parades, this year's event will not take place on Veterans Day.

"The VFW had chosen

Nov. 8 because we wanted to do something on Nov. 11 here at the post for our veterans," Valliere said.

Both local military organizations feel it's important to continue the time honored tradition of celebrating Veterans Day with a local parade. "It (parade) just reminds the community that the veterans are here and that we're available to serve our community, honor our local heroes and people who wrote a blank check," Valliere said. "I'm just super-excited to be chosen to chair the whole event. It's a big responsibility to the community, our veterans and I'm just super-excited."

Valliere will be emailing all of the parade entrants roughly a week before the event so they have all the rules and regulations to participate in the event.
